Reflection: Deluded by Pride. But sometimes the temptation comes under the pretext of virtue, and this temptation is more difficult than any other to recognize as such. Only the humble recognize it and cannot be deceived by it. And here is the pretext of virtue that the devil presents. Suppose he finds us ignorant and lacking in the virtue of humility or true self-knowledge, still imperfect and not knowing ourselves sufficiently—even though we may have begun to desire God and show signs of virtue. He lets us see things about our neighbors, spiritually as well as materially (that is, in matters spiritual and material), and then the devil blows with the wind of rash judgment. We wickedly pass judgment on our neighbors and on God's servants and on the servants of the world, and we aren't even aware of it. We would steal the right of judgment from God's hand—for only God has the right to judge. . . . But we are deluded by the pride within us. If we were truly humble, grounded in true self-knowledge, we would be ashamed to see ourselves being so judgmental, because we would see that it is tantamount to wanting to make rules for God. For we are trying to make rules for God when we take scandal in God's servants by wanting to direct people in our way rather than as God calls them. Those who are grounded on Christ the living rock will resist such impulses and not give in to them. With true humility they will try to be glad and give glory to God for the ways and practices of his servants. . . . In this way they pick the rose from among the thorns. And they keep their mind sincere. ~St. Catherine of Siena

March for Life

Tom and Lisa Ridder (St. Mary's Parish, Marienthal) are coordinating a bus pilgrimage for the Catholic Diocese of Dodge City to the March for Life in Washington, D.C. next January. Tentative plans call for the pilgrimage to commence at the Cathedral of Our Lady of Guadalupe in Dodge City on Wednesday, January 16, then travel to Larned and Great Bend to pick up additional participants. Pilgrims will travel overnight on the bus and arrive in D.C. mid-morning on January 17. Pilgrims will take part in a public rosary in D.C., tour the St. John Paul II Shrine, the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception, attend a "Life is Very Good Rally" the eve of the March and then the main rally and March for Life on January 18th. A night-time walking tour of the nation's monuments and a bus tour of Arlington National Cemetery are also planned. Buses will depart Washington on Saturday, January 19 and arrive in Great Bend, Larned and Dodge City between 6 and 8 p.m. on Sunday, January 20. The projected cost per person is \$400, and includes bus travel and overnight accommodations in D.C. A priest of the Diocese of Dodge City will accompany the pilgrimage.
